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Course Description

The purpose of this course is to offer students political, economic, social and analytical insights into understanding global health issues and policies. It examines how power relations and values help determine choices made about how to confront health issues. Students will develop conceptual frameworks to understand determinants of health in developed and developing nations. Of special interest in this course are pandemics like the current COVID-19, HIV/AIDS, EBOLA, and Pharmaceutical Corporations and Medical Research. We shall explore the political and philosophical debates surrounding health issues. The course is organized around the following themes.

- x Theory, ideology and politics: Critical perspectives
- x Paradigmatic differences about ethical implications of health care
- x The health of individuals
- x Individuals, society, and health obligations to other societies
- X Institutions and Health PolicyCivil Society: Politics and Health Policy
- x Challenges/effective responses
- x In addition, there will be case studies that illustrate and probe the topics outlined above.

Course Objectives

Upon successful completion of the course the students will

- 1) understand the political, diplomatic, and philosophical underpinnings of any health policy issue
- 2) be familiar with the political roles of individuals, societies, institutions, and political leaders relative to health policy
- 3) be able to identify and classify the major factors affecting a major health issue
- 4) to develop skills in case analysis

Design original research to test arguments and hypothesis with qualitative and/or quantitative approaches
