

The Saint Louis University Clinical Psychology Doctoral Program in the Department of Psychology (referred to as “our Program”) makes every effort to provide education that is compliant with national standards and to prepare students to practice practical psychology. As recognition of our compliance with national standards, our Program is accredited by the American Psychological Association¹. The practice of psychology, however, is regulated at the state level. State licensing authorities, commonly referred to as “State Boards,” determine the specific educational and training requirements for licensure in their State. Of note, many states require postdoctoral training as well as examinations beyond educational and training requirements. As such, a PhD degree from our Program is not sufficient, in and of itself, to meet licensure requirements in most states.

If you are planning to pursue professional licensure or certification, it is strongly recommended that you contact the appropriate licensing entity in the state for which you are seeking licensure. Board’s online tool, PsyBook (<https://www.asppb.net/page/psybook>
